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Introduction to Advent

This leads to an anticipation of the return of Christ the King in his Second Advent. Thus, Advent is far more than simply marking a 2,000 year old event in history. It is celebrating the revelation of God in Christ through which all of creation might be reconciled to Him!

Advent also symbolizes the spiritual journey of individuals and a congregation, whereby we affirm that Christ has come, that He is present in the world today, and that He will come again in majesty. This truth provides a basis for Kingdom living with our call to be faithful stewards of what is entrusted to us as God's people. Because He Lives

It was Friday December 1st, 1978 in Jackson Mississippi, a brilliant beautiful day as far as the weather went. I remember the sun shined so bright that day that it hurt my eyes as I held Mommy in my arms and I thought, she's going home today that's why it was such a brilliantly beautiful day. It was as if the Angel's in Heaven were all rejoicing, but I was not...

Mommy had taken a turn for the worse a month before to the very day. The cancer had spread. I had just turned eighteen and I was enrolled in my first semester at Mississippi College, a Southern Baptist College, in a quiet nearby little area called Clinton. I called her doctor that morning to see if he thought I should even go to class as he had been out to the house the day before, she was failing quickly. He said he thought I should go to class, that she would be alright for a couple of hours with my Grandmother there who had come from NY to help me care for her at the end, but something in my heart said no don't go, and I did not. Mommy and I had a very special bond that I was blessed beyond belief to have had with her and something told me today was the day that she would go to be with the Lord and my life would be forever changed....

At 2:32 PM Friday December 1st, 1978 she left me as she lay in my arms to go be with the Lord and I thought my life was over... I wanted to go with her and I prayed to God for strength to go on because I knew that both He and Mommy would not want me to be so broken. I still had to tell my 8 yr. old sister when she got off the bus, that Mommy had gone to be with Jesus... I kept reciting the Footprints poem to myself in my head. I remember that but the next day, as we were making all the arrangements, my Grandmother seemed very agitated with me and said "Barbara! Would you stop that!" Well, I looked at her like she was crazy because I had not said or done anything at the time, and I replied, "what are you talking about"? I thought she had lost her mind! She replied "stop humming that stupid song! You have been humming it all day today, all day yesterday, even since early yesterday morning." It was then that I realized without even knowing it I had been humming the Bill and Gloria Gaither song, **BECAUSE HE LIVES**, pretty much according to my Grandmother, for two whole days....

I did not realize then but many years later just how much strength my precious Lord had given me that day with the gift of his love, his comfort, strength and grace that I believe he gave to me in the guise of a simple song called **BECAUSE HE LIVES...**.

A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The Spirit of the Lord will rest on him, the Spirit of wisdom and of understanding, the Spirit of counsel and of might, the Spirit of the knowledge and fear of the Lord-

and he will delight in the fear of the Lord.

He will not judge by what he sees with his eyes, or decide by what he hears with his ears but with righteousness he will judge the needy, with justice he will give decisions for the poor of the earth. He will strike the earth with the rod of his mouth; with the breath of his lips he will slay the wicked. Righteousness will be his belt

and faithfulness the sash around his waist.

The wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling together; and a little child will lead them. The cow will feed with the bear, their young will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox. The infant will play near the cobra's den, and the young child will put its hand into the viper's nest. This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." - Matthew 1:18-21

When reading this portion of scripture, we notice how at the very outset, God inspired Matthew to give an orderly account of the birth of our Savior. The details given describe the unfolding events and circumstances surrounding the lives of Joseph and Mary at the time. To the common observer, the things that were happening in this couple's lives were anything but orderly (in keeping with Jewish custom), much less, divinely inspired. The people in Mary and Joseph's community knew that Mary was pregnant and that she and Joseph, though espoused to be married, were not yet married.

In our lives, we often wonder how difficult and sometimes chaotic circumstances can be orchestrated by or even allowed by God. Casual observers may even say to themselves, "If they are professing Christians, how can these things be happening to them?" From an earthly standpoint, it's impossible to figure out.

These Scriptures, though supremely unique as describing the story of Jesus' First Advent, are also another great example from the Bible how God can bring about order, accompanied by His peace - as He intertwines a higher purpose in the midst of great challenges in our lives as believers. He looks far beyond what we can see, and is forever at work behind the scenes with sublime intention to bring about His will in our lives and in the world.

All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel"—which means, "God with us." When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. But he had no union with her until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

- Matthew 1:22-25

An Angelic visit informed Joseph of the truth, and he obeyed God immediately. Matthew recorded two more Angelic visits to Joseph, emphasizing Joseph's part in the unfolding of God's prophetic plan for the birth of His son. The angel explained to Joseph the meaning of the name Jesus and the mission of the child whom Mary was carrying. Joseph obeyed the instructions the angels had given in the dream. He did as the Lord's Angel had commanded him, he married Mary which culminated in Joseph's taking her to his home to live with him. Joseph was willing to share the scorn - and doubtless the blame - Mary's pregnancy would generate. Joseph knew her not until after the birth of Jesus. His obedience was matched by his courage, which should inspire us to follow through with whatever God calls us to do.

Matthew cited this verse(Matthew 1:23)as he wrote, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, the birth narrative of Jesus. The virginal conception of Jesus remains a unique event in all history. The conception enabled Jesus to be both "Son of God" and "Son of Man." The two names given to our Lord at His birth summarize His unique nature: Jesus means, "God is salvation," showing "His diety," and Immanual means, "God is with us," showing His humanity."

Having a child can be one of the most rewarding, but stressful, times in the life of a person. Weight gain, hospital bills, late nights, sleep deprivation, etc. are all far from peaceful. These are all things normal people in today's world go through, but add in that the baby is the son of God and we cannot even begin to see what Mary went through. She was just a teenage girl waiting to be married to her fiancé, Joseph, but after being visited by an angel and being told her son will be the messiah, Mary simply responded, "I am the Lord's servant. Thursday, December 17

In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) And everyone went to his own town to register. So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son.

She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger,

because there was no room for them in the inn. - Luke 2:1-7

Luke 2:1-7 details many ways that Love Came Down when Jesus was born as Luke gives us a view into the events surrounding the birth of Jesus. God sent LOVE in the person of Jesus Christ, who gave up His kingly, heavenly presence to live among mankind and truly show us the meaning of LOVE. LOVE is personified in Joseph for the way he cared for, and believed Mary.

Caesar Augustus considered himself to be god and declared that all his subjects would pay homage to him, even requiring them to travel to the city of their ancestors. Since Joseph was an ancestor of David, he had to go to Bethlehem to be counted and pay his taxes to Caesar. (This also fulfils the prophecy in Micah 5:2).

We often, in our thoughts, think of Joseph and Mary leaving Nazareth on December 24, arriving late to Bethlehem, giving birth on December 25, and heading out to Egypt on the 26th. The trip from Nazareth to Bethlehem was about 80 miles, so on foot and donkey, it took several days. In all likelihood, Joseph and Mary were in Bethlehem several days before the birth of Jesus. Also, as Joseph's family was from Bethlehem, it seems likely that they would have had family to stay with, but perhaps other family members had occupied all the guest rooms ahead of them; but it was also custom for peasants to give birth in a barn where the hay could absorb some of the birthing fluids. After birth, babies were normally wrapped in swaddling cloths, strips of cloth tied tightly around the baby to keep the baby warm and help straighten the body. So, it appears that Jesus's birth was very much like the births of most babies in the first century.

We love this passage in Luke and all the pageantry we have assigned to it. Today, at Christmas, families will travel great distances to be together, just as Joseph and Mary did. God showed his LOVE for humankind by choosing to have His Son born of a peasant girl who was betrothed to a very LOVING man who would take care of both Mary and Jesus. God's Son being born in this manner, instead of in a castle or palace somewhere, shows that God LOVED us enough to become like we are.

This love narrative told by the gospel writer, Luke, quietly espouses the simple but earnest message of humility. The Son of the God, the King of all Kings, the Prince of Peace... his birth was announced by an angel of the Lord to *shepherds*. Shepherds who stood on the bottom rung of the social ladder, an unenviable status. Shepherds... who are called loathsome in Genesis 46:34 and whose profession was considered a type of punishment if you read Numbers 14.33. The illustration of God's unspoiled and eternal love gift to mankind is the subtext of the shepherd's role. "We can trust that God had a specific purpose for this shepherd audience, and the work they performed suggests the reason. These men who watched the sheep meant for the slaughter received a divine message about the ultimate Lamb who would take away the sins of the world through his death and resurrection." (Alfred Edersheim, The Life and Times of Jesus the Messiah)

Our Heavenly Father had planned from the beginning, to time and again, use men and women of low social standing; of questionable moral character; even prosecutors of the faithful; to advance His Kingdom. He chose humble people who became believers in our Living God to fulfill prophecy, to write our Bible, and to teach us through perfect example that every soul is worthy of our Christian benevolence and prayer, especially during the Advent season.

Remember, I lived in CA and the lights from stores, street lights etc. blocked out the beauty of the stars at night.

- There was a crispness in the air which made everything seem clean and refreshing.
- The sky was crystal clear. It was the kind of night we imagine when we think of a chorus of angels singing to frightened shepherds.
- The blackness was a deep, rich, velvet midnight blue.
- The stars were not spots of light but brilliant, magical diamonds that danced and flickered against the dark night. The sky was somehow alive.

When Van Gogh painted Starry Night he was suffering from a debilitating disease. Perhaps Van Gogh felt God's majesty as I did and realized he was not alone. I believe Van Gogh felt something so powerful that he went beyond the familiar to express it in his painting.

- The sky swirls across the canvas are full of vitality and power that speaks of God's presence.
- The stars don't just sparkle; they explode in radiance.
- The windows of the houses glow with the same light that illuminates the universe.
- The cypress trees capture the joy by erupting in a living flame of praise.
- And the church steeple reaches up and points to God

This is the sky the shepherds saw looking up at the heavenly host, who (singing with happiness) proclaimed the Glory of God and His love for us.

So intensely devout was this man that Luke records the working of the Holy Spirit in him three times. That's powerful. Simeon was a man whose character and devotion we can seek to emulate. God rewarded Simeon's devotion and righteousness with a special insight by the Holy Spirit that allowed Simeon to recognize Christ, The Messiah. And Simeon did. The Holy Spirit moved him to go to the temple courts where he saw Jesus, took him in his arms and issued a hymn of praise to God for the Christ that lay in his arms. I felt with my fingertips the cold water beside me. Just trying to raise my head made me pass out. Terry realized I had a serious injury and called 911. Laying on the ground in the water, waiting for the ambulance, my head was swelling up fast and filled up the palm of my hand. I wondered if those were my last clear thoughts and if I would pass out forever. I prayed to God. I was not afraid and if it was my time to go home to the father I was ready.

I made it to the hospital and spent a long week from Christmas Eve to New Year's Eve at a Miami hospital.

It has been a long year of recovery, and yes there is such a thing as PTSD, but with the heartfelt prayers and love from family and friends, I feel so blessed and better every day.

Epiphany

On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, they returned to their country by another route.

- Matthew 2:11-12

Epiphany is the celebration of the recognition of Jesus by the gentiles through the gifts of the Magi or wise men. The Bible doesn't actually say how many Magi there were. 3 is just the traditional thought because of the 3 gifts.

These wise men, probably of middle eastern heritage, brought 3 gifts that were the traditional gifts given to a king at the time. The Bible doesn't say how much of each gift they brought, but we can imagine that they were as generous as was possible. You don't exactly scrimp when paying homage to a king!

The most precious of the 3 gifts at the time was the myrrh which was very rare. The frankincense would be the next most costly gift and the gold would follow as the next most precious. As an example, when Tutankamen's grave was robbed, it was the gallons of essential oils that were stolen, not the gold. All 3 are, not only actual pragmatic gifts given and used somehow throughout Jesus' life, but are also items with much symbolism in the Bible.

The *gold* symbolizes Jesus' Diety and Kingship.

The *frankincense* which was used in the incense in the temple, of God's own recipe, was a symbol of prayers wafting up like smoke to God as a pleasant aroma. So the frankincense symbolizes Jesus' duties as our High Priest.

Last of all, the *myrrh* was used in burials and symbolizes the coming sacrifice of Jesus as our Savior.

Jesus doesn't want these precious gifts from us today. Instead, He wants the most precious gift that we can ever give Him- our hearts- which includes obedience, belief, service, praise and worship of God for all eternity. After all we can't scrimp when giving homage to the King of Kings.

May Jesus' gift to us of His Forgiving Blood be the one true gift that matters most and inspires our every day in service to Him.
