Then a robin, with a fat worm dangling from its mouth, landed Anne concluded her article, "Why not start right near my door and looked at me. It was a vivid reminder to me of Jesus' words in Matthew 6:25-26, 'Do not worry about your life...Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they?"

Anne then uses an article for the Denver Seminary magazine Focal Point, guoting Paul Bor-

den's helpful suggestions for worriers:

- START A WORRY LIST—Write down 1. what you are worried about. The bills. Your job. Your children or grandchildren. Your health. Your future.
- TURN YOUR WORRY INTO A PRAYER LIST—Ask the Lord to work in those situations you are concerned about. Pray specifically for your needs and depend on Him
- 3. TURN YOUR PRAYER LIST INTO AN **ACTION LIST**—If you receive insight on something you can do about your cares, do it. As we turn our worries in to prayer and action, Borden says, "Paralyzing anxiety can be replaced by concern for the responsibilities of life."

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Deacon's Devotional

I'm guessing many of you have heard, memorized and quoted this phrase. "Sticks and stones may break my bones but names will never hurt me." I wish I could remember how many times I mumbled that saying to myself through tears looking to find much needed comfort. I have always struggled with my weight and, as you can imagine, growing up with this problem at times was brutal to say the least. So, I must say this saying of "sticks and stones may break my bones but names will never hurt me" couldn't be any further from the truth.

James 3:5 tells us that the tongue is a "small" part of the body, yet Proverbs 18:21 says it "has the power of life and death." Our words can create actions, good and bad. For example, a judge or jury, by simply saying a word, can cause a person to be put to death or to live. Words often save lives. A doctor advises surgery, a weatherman issues a tornado warning, a counselor gives hope to a suicidal person, and just like words can save lives, words can also kill.

Murders are often initiated because of arguments or words spoken in hatred. James 3:6 describes the tongue as "a fire." He compares the damage the tongue can do to a raging fire. The uncontrolled tongue can do terrible damage. So before we speak, we will do good to remember that words are like fire, you can neither control or reverse the damage they can do. And, just like how our reckless words can cut like a sword. Proverbs 15:4 says our tongue can be described as a "tree of life." Which means our words can be used to renew, refresh, and to heal.

Week Of Prayer For North American Missions March 4-11, 2018

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
