When was the first Thanksgiving celebrated in America? Some say it was in Virginia in 1610, and others hold fast to our traditional first Thanksgiving celebrated at Plymouth Plantation, Massachusetts, in 1621. Whichever side of the debate one chooses to embrace, the fact remains that Thanksgiving Day is ours.

Before America existed as a nation, the hardy souls who persevered to found this great country made the effort to thank God Almighty for His provision and grace. Giving thanks in Virginia, Massachusetts, and many other settlements across the new world was a spontaneous act by grateful people. They experienced a life so rugged, that without the providence of God they would have surely not survived. They were grateful for God's favor and blessing.

Our first President, George Washington, acknowledged God as the source of our Nation's strength and very existence. He felt so strongly about this that he made a proclamation for a national day of Thanksgiving on Thursday, November 26th, 1789.

He believed in the importance of setting aside a day to honor God and give thanks individually and corporately as a people. Our sixteenth President, Abraham Lincoln, made it a national holiday on Thursday, November 26th, 1863.

This day is meant to be a time to stop, take notice of our blessings, and acknowledge God with a grateful heart. We all share in the responsibility for the national event that Thanksgiving Day has become because it is our day.

I am so thankful to God that He has given us the freedom to worship Him with our thanks. The blessings that we enjoy over this holiday are truly from Him.

I believe God continues to bless us in part because we do take a day to give thanks. The Bible says: "Give thanks to the LORD and proclaim his greatness. Let the whole world know what he has done," (I Chron. 16:8).

Let us pass on to the next generation the knowledge of how blessed we are as individuals, families, and as a people. Speak of the mighty and wondrous things that the Lord has done, and share our thankful hearts one with another. "Let each generation tell its children of your mighty acts; let them proclaim your power," (Psalm 145:4).

Gene Markland concludes by quoting from author O. Henry who wrote, "There is one day that is ours. There is one day when all we Americans who are not self-made go back to the old home to eat biscuits and marvel how much nearer to the porch the old pump looks than it used to. Deacon's Devotional

Thanksgiving

When the month of November arrives, most people today begin to think of Thanksgiving Day with families getting together for a big turkey dinner with all the trimmings, finishing with pumpkin pie and other special desserts. We recall our early school years with stories and pictures of the Pilgrims and native American Indians celebrating God's blessing of a successful corn harvest. History records tell us this 3-day event occurred in November 1621 and a second fasting and Thanksgiving feasting celebration was held again in 1623. Annual and occasional days of Thanksgiving became a common practice in the New England colonies after this. President George Washington issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation on 3 October 1789 for Americans to express their gratitude (to God) for gaining independence and ratifying the U.S. Constitution. Subsequent proclamation of special days of Thanksgiving, although individual states did not always observe their celebrations on the same date, followed. On the last Thursday of November 1863, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln declared a national holiday of "Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens"..."to commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife" and to "heal the wounds of the nation". This national day of Thanksgiving was celebrated on this date every year until 1939 when President Franklin Roosevelt moved the holiday to the fourth Thursday of November and signed a bill to that effect in 1941. To this day, we continue to observe Thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday of November.

Though some fail to remember, and non-Christians may not be aware, our Thanksgiving celebration is much more than family gatherings and feasting. As Americans we celebrate our unique freedoms, especially our religious freedom. But more than that, it is a time when Christians express our gratitude and thanks for God's love, mercy, blessings, and promise of eternal life, and patience with those of His creation. It is true that God causes the sun to shine and the rain to fall on all; but not all are His children. We only come into the family of God (as His children) when we accept His Plan of Salvation through Jesus Christ His Son. In John 14:6 Jesus said the following:

> "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."


