Introduction to Advent

Advent is a time of joy and anticipation. It is a time to prepare for the coming of Jesus Christ. The word 'advent' comes from the Latin term 'adventus' meaning 'arrival' or 'coming,' particularly the coming of something having great importance. Advent season, then, is a time of joy-filled, anticipatory celebration of the arrival of Jesus Christ. The season of Advent is a time to prepare for the coming of Jesus not only at Christmas, but also in our lives.

Advent is a time of both hope and repentance. We hope for the coming of Jesus Christ, but we also remember that Jesus will come again one day to judge the living and the dead. We must be prepared for his coming, both now and in the future.



Advent Wreath - Lighting an Advent wreath is a custom that began by Christians in 16th-century Germany. Typically, the Advent wreath is a garland with four or five candles arranged on the wreath. During Advent, one candle is lit each Sunday as a part of the corporate Advent services.

The traditional structure involves three purple candles and one pink candle, set in a wreath, and often with a single, larger white candle in the center. One more candle is lit each week of Advent culminating with the lighting of the white Christ candle.

The advent candles and their colors are packed with rich meaning. Each represents a specific aspect of the spiritual preparations for Christmas. The three main colors are purple, pink, and white. Purple symbolizes repentance and royalty. Pink represents joy and rejoicing. And white stands for the purity and light of Christ.

The first candle lit on the Advent wreath reminds us of the light of **HOPE** that the prophets had in their expectation of a Messiah who would bring peace and love to the world.

—Isaiah 7:14

The Jews had already been heavily afflicted by the Assyrian Tiglath-pileser and more so by his successor Shalmaneser. Isaiah reminded them that they will suffer further certain and longer lasting destruction as God had commanded. (This prophecy will be fulfilled in due time by the Babylonian Nebuchadnezzar.) Isaiah begins to alleviate their fear by speaking of a "great light" bringing life and hope in the future! In these few verses he carries them from terror to hope as he describes gaining a larger kingdom, reaping full harvests, and winning victories over their enemies. Isaiah mentions Midian as a caution that the victories of the past were at the hand of God alone, and that He is the one ending the wars, not the people.

It's remarkable how we can be carried from despair to hope and joy so quickly, and to be assured that we will reap rewards unimaginable. God's determination to redeem his people is reflected in Matthew's note that the "rays of light" extended to Galilee, and Paul's quotation from Hosea "I will call them my people which were not my people". Christ's light thus extends far beyond the small remnant of Jews, to all nations, for all time, and embraces us in full salvation and joy for eternity!

All of this will be accomplished by God's gift of his Son to all people. What He will be and what rank He will achieve are described in His titles. Wonderful Counsellor. Mighty God. Everlasting Father. Prince of Peace. His government will extend through eternity. Anticipate that!

A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The beginning of the good news about Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God, as it is written in Isaiah the prophet: "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way a voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.'" — Mark 1:1-3

Mark's theme is telling the good news about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. His purpose is to emphasize the servant role of Jesus. He draws from two Old Testament books to show that one would come before Jesus as a 'messenger' calling the people to repentance. Malachi 3:1 & Isaiah 40:3 were fulfilled prophecies with John the Baptist as the "messenger" and "the voice of one crying in the wilderness". Mark's gospel shows that John the Baptist carried out his mission by telling the people to repent of their sins and then baptizing them.

The Christian life begins by accepting Jesus as their Savior and following through with water baptism. We, as Christians are to be a messenger for Jesus today. My Christian life began at an early age, but over the years I was not always faithful to Jesus. After marriage, Travis and I became involved in church and began to use our Spiritual Gifts to serve Him. As we grew older, life began to change. We knew we would not be able to take care of ourselves very long, especially after I had two heart attacks. Our son, Tommy, bought a house in Gloucester and invited us to live with him. Just when things were going along fine, Travis fell and broke his femur and then had a heart attack. As he was getting better, I fell flat of my face with my two front teeth going through my top lip.

AGAIN, God was faithful in seeing me through another episode. Right after I fell, a young lady walked up and said "I am a nurse & paramedic, can I help you?" She took charge, calling the ambulance and getting me loaded to be taken to Walter Reed. Emergency Room staff were wonderful, but felt like I needed to see a specialist, regarding my teeth. They transferred me to Sentara/Norfolk General. I spent the night there, getting reevaluated all over again. After the last exam, they rolled me in a room and left me for hours, before a male nurse asked if there was anything else I needed. I asked, "Do you know Jesus as your Savior"? He responded, "I believe in God, but I don't know Jesus personally." I asked, "Would you like to know about Jesus.?" He propped his arms on the railing of my bed and answered. "I am going to take a break and you can share about Jesus."

I began with John 3:16, sharing that God loves him already. The verses that I learned in the faith class began to come to me as I shared with him. As I finished he stated that was a lot for him to take in at this time. He wanted to think about it for awhile before he made a decision. He stated that he had a Bible. I suggested that he read the book of John to see how much Jesus loves him. I prayed for him asking the Holy Spirit to help him make a decision. Before he left my room, I told him that I believed God sent me there just to witness to him. He responded that it may be so. Oh, what JOY filled my heart, knowing that one more person knows about Jesus, and at the right time will make a decision to follow Him. My job was done, I was His messenger.

who is called the Messiah. — Matthew 1:1-17

God is not silent. He speaks to His people. In the Garden He walked with Adam and Eve. After the Fall, God spoke through signs, wonders, stories, and prophets. From a burning bush to a man robed in camel's hair, God continued to speak. From a donkey to educated men to a shepherd and a fruit-picker, we learn that God does not leave His people alone.

These signs, wonders, and prophets speak the word of God, the gospel of the coming Christ. Each repeats the message heard from the beginning that a victor would arise to crush the serpent. With Moses this repetition took the form of, "The LORD God of your fathers . . . will bring you up out of the affliction of Egypt . . .unto a land flowing with milk and honey . . . and, you shall not go empty." Isaiah declared that "unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given: and the government shall be upon His shoulder: and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, the mighty God, the everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. Of the increase of His government and peace there shall be no end." Standing on the shoulders of these men, John the Baptist linked their words to Jesus. He prepared the way of the Lord by calling Israel to "Repent, for the kingdom of Heaven is near." Jesus, he declared, was the mighty victor—one so mighty that John felt unworthy to even untie His shoes.

God still speaks. To that of the prophets God adds the voice of his Son. Jesus repeats and then fulfils their words—a messenger better by far. Let us rejoice in the Advent prophecies for they stand fulfilled. And as Jesus goes forth victoriously, let us heed the Father's command:

(which means "God with us"). When Joseph woke up,

In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) And everyone went to their own town to register.

So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them. - Luke 2:1:7

It never ceases to amaze me how God works throughout the Bible and in our lives today. The day that I received my Advent scripture, Luke 2:1-7, my Bible chapter of the day was I Chronicles 21. In that chapter, David seemingly wavered in his faith and took a census of all the fighting men in Israel. Instead of trusting in God for all Israel's victories over their enemies, David trusted in numerical superiority. He immediately regretted his decision and was filled with shame.

In Luke 2 we see that Caesar Augustus also took a census. This time it was a census for everyone within the rule of the Roman Empire, thus sending Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem where Jesus would be born. The census David took was under the influence of Satan, but the census from Caesar Augustus was ordained by God to fulfill a prophesy from the Old Testament. Here, we contrast two men in power making the same decision, but under the influence of polar opposite forces.

We can learn many things from these passages, but mostly that God has a plan and is in control, even in the seemingly random and mundane decisions we make every day. As we see in the Bible, a cumulation of these decisions not only led to some amazing stories that we can study and analyze, but also to the birth of our Savior in a way that no one but God could have manufactured.

This Christmas, let us remember how our omnipotent God is in control of both the large and small things in our lives. He works all things for the good of those who love Him, even creating a way for us to be united with Him eternally through His Son.

We aren't there yet. The Advent is not yet complete but, just as the shepherds spread the word of what they witnessed and glorified God, so should we on this amazing journey. We anticipate the joy of our Savior's birth.

She was very old; she had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. Who was this Anna, a woman in the temple who was so obedient and faithful unto our Lord that she worshiped night and day through fasting and prayer? She is named as a prophet, a widow of many decades, from the tribe of Asher – one of ten lost tribes of northern Israel after Assyrian forced displacement in 721 BC. How was it this *woman*, from a tribe long before assimilated into other peoples, who was without a husband, could be the very first proclaimer of Jesus as the Messiah of Israel?! Recall, women of that day could not testify in court, could not pray in public at the temple - were essentially to be seen and not heard.

Anna's sincere obedience and deep prayerful faith was cherished and abundantly rewarded by God in that He ordained this humble servant, old Anna, would recognize the young baby Jesus amongst others in the crowded temple and *know* she was in the presence of our Mighty King. And you know what – she testified the testimony since heard around the world – this Child is the promised redemption of Jerusalem.

¹⁵He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. ¹⁶For by Him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by Him and for Him. ¹⁷He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together. ¹⁸And He is the head of the body, the church; He is the beginning and the firstborn from among the dead, so that in everything He might have the supremacy. ¹⁹For God was pleased to have all His fullness dwell in Him, ²⁰and through Him to reconcile to Himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through His blood, shed on the cross.

Colossians 1:15-20

This passage is a VERY IMPORTANT description of our Lord Jesus Christ! Now read it again and bask in Christ's divine nature. He is the image of the invisible God. Christ created everything. Jesus holds all things together. He is the head of the church. Christ reconciled all of us by His death on the cross. Our Lord is the beginning.

This passage takes the time to explain each definition made. In verse 15 our invisible God is defined as the firstborn over all creation. Now look at Christ's creation, described in detail, in verse 16. Explanations continue throughout.

Notice Jesus is the image of the invisible God. He is before all things (verse 17). He is the beginning and the firstborn (verse 18). Does this remind you of John 1:1? "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."

We see the equalness of Christ and God several times here. In verse 18, Christ is the beginning and has the supremacy. All God's fullness dwelt in Jesus and God used Jesus to reconcile us to Him. This reminds us of John 1:1: "The Word was God".

As we celebrate Christmas let us rejoice with Joy as we welcome God's peace and anticipate God choosing our new pastor in 2023 at G.P.B.C.

He was in the world, and though the world was made through him,
the world did not recognize him. He came to that which was his own,
but his own did not receive him. Yet to all who did receive him,
to those who believed in his name,

- John 1:9-12

Deep in the pages of the Old Testament, stands an icon of promise and grace. As it is examined, the true treasure of this image becomes beautifully illustrated. It is the Tabernacle of Moses described in *Exodus*. Now, I know what you are thinking..."What does the Tabernacle have to do with Christmas?" Well, I'm glad you asked!

The Outer Courts of the Tabernacle represent our beginning relationship with God. We come to Jesus at the Altar of Sacrifice, asking forgiveness for our sins. We come as we are. He meets us there and makes us new.

The central section was called The Holy Place. The materials used in the room were specifically chosen to represent God's deity and holiness. This chamber represents His Church. In it, there were only three pieces of furniture:

- The Table of Shewbread, signifying the breaking of bread and fellowship within the church (Inreach)
- The Altar of Incense, signifying the sweet wafting of our prayer up to the Lord (Up-reach), and
- The Golden Lampstand, which shattered the darkness. (Outreach) Exodus 25, 27

Let's focus on this symbol of light. The Lampstand was the only light in the room, constantly burning and made from gold. The Levites would carefully trim the wicks and change the pure oil everyday.

John 1:9 declares Jesus as the true Light of the World. Like John the Baptist (verse 8), we are not the light, but we bear witness to the Light.

Dear ones, we are the Lampstand! Our quest is to carry the Light of the World. When the singed blackness of sin impedes our flame, it must be cut away. We are carefully trimmed daily by the Word of God. We are also filled with the pure oil of the Holy Spirit. He fuels us to keep Christ's light burning in our hearts. He gives us boldness and wisdom, empowering us to illuminate the world with His perfect love.

All who believe in His name and receive Him, become His children. (verse 12) We are granted all rights, privileges and responsibilities as His offspring. We are children of the Light. As we know Him more, He reveals His heart to us. When He reveals His heart to us, our response is to love Him more. To love Him more is to share Him with others.
